
### Supporting the government's agenda...

### Having fun with Science!

'A good education is the greatest gift you can give yourself or anyone else' strongly reminds a poster on the walls of the MS Swaminathan Research Foundation (MSSRF), housed in quaint old buildings set amidst lush greenery at Taramani, Chennai. The campus is a temple of learning where research scholars and students collaborate and dig deeper to find solutions to problems faced by humanity.

At one of the sprawling halls, the infrastructure is all set, the learned teachers, counselors, and attenders waiting with lots of love to attend to visiting students who are more than eager to make the most of the day.

This is the everyday scenario at the Science Lab set up at MSSRF, with the help of L&T Construction in September 2021. Conceived to inculcate a scientific temper among children from underserved segments, the 15-day program, has thus far covered over 300 students from various government schools in the city.

"Catch them young and help them grow," shares **Dr. G. N. Hariharan,** Executive Director, MSSRF with a glint in his eyes. "In this immersive training environment, we provide hands-on experience in the ML, CL, smart classrooms, guided by skillful teachers. A student's exposure and experience in the early years will have a significant impact on their later learning and with a scientific temper they can develop a range of skills." he adds sagely.

Science is everywhere, which is why a visit to the Nutri-garden provides so many opportunities for the students to learn.

Hariharan goes on to add that "though it may look simple for a learned scholar, there are some of the important **outcomes of our outreach program."** 

#### At the MSSRF facility students get to

- Raise numerous questions and get them answered from readily available teachers
- Explore objects, materials, and events based on scientific evidence
- Understand new concepts and make careful observations
- Try their hand at simple investigations

- Record their observations using words, pictures, charts and scientific models
- Identify patterns and relationships in nature and biodiversity
- Work collaboratively with others. Science promotes working together and discussing ideas
- Share and discuss ideas with each other and hear new perspectives
- Improve their confidence and increase self-esteem. In a way the program shapes the children's social life too

All these are important attributes that help stimulate scientific thought.

Little Oviya, studying in 7<sup>th</sup> at the CGHSS, Chennai has been attending these modules at MSSRF for the past 11 days. She looks forward to learn more about agriculture when she grows up for she is fascinated about how water is stored in leaves. Modules about crystal formation interested her and that tickled her curiosity as to how little shapes of diamonds were formed within a tiny little crystal.

"Stepping into a lab with big machines, each of a different type, excites me to attend these classes," she enthuses. "This place has paved way for a lot of 'first times' in my life," she adds after observing bacteria formation for the first time under a microscope.

### Caring on golden wings!

In a wonderful act of giving and to celebrate the spirit of 'Joy of Giving', 268 large-hearted L&T-ites came forward to contribute nearly Rs. 5.90 lakhs to support the NGO, Golden Butterflies, who help and support a noble cause of caring for terminally ill children. When receiving the cheque, Mrs. Stella Mathews, Founder–Golden Butterflies, said that caring for ill children was certainly not a difficult task. "We are a five-year-old set-up with a group of dedicated caretakers and this contribution will go a long way to reach out to even more children and spread more joy." 60+ L&T-ites had donated about Rs. 3.75 lakhs in October 2021 to support three Chennai-based NGOs providing palliative care.



#### What is palliative care?

According to the World Health Organization, palliative care is an approach to improve the quality of life of patients (adults and children) and their families who are facing problems associated with life-threatening illness. It prevents and relieves suffering through the early identification, correct assessment and treatment of pain and other problems, whether physical, psycho-social, or spiritual. Adopting a team approach to support patients and their caregivers, palliative care givers address practical needs, provide bereavement counselling, and offer a support system to help patients live as actively as possible until death.

The Lancet, a weekly peer-reviewed general medical journal, one of the oldest of its kind and the world's highest-impact academic journal, estimates that

2.5 million children worldwide die every year requiring palliation, of who more than 98% are from developing regions. These include children suffering from: cancer, irreversible organ failures, HIV/AIDS, neuromuscular or neurodegenerative disorders, severe cerebral palsy, and others. This is the space that Golden Butterflies operates in.

It is one thing to add years to life but quite another to add life to years. While medicines ensure longevity, it is moments of joy and long stretches of happiness, that enrich lives and our contributions have already made a huge difference to the lives of hundreds of child-patients.

A magic show, music, dance, and art on Children's Day lit up the lives of 170+children (inpatients and outpatients) and their families while in another event, 400+ child patients at the Institute of Child Health, Egmore and St. Jude India Childcare Centre, Royapettah were thrilled to bits. # Nurturing sustainable thinking among school students



Govt Higher Secondary School, Kolapakkam, and Govt Girls Higher Secondary School, Poonamallee.

The school authorities say that the students welcome any indigenous solutions to address the water crisis, something they face frequently where they live. Before the RWH structures were built, along with their school bags students had to carry water from home for all requirements. Such hardships are now a thing of the past.

With the groundwater replenished, and water table levels improved, water supply is adequate. RWH structures have even helped improve attendance, especially among the girl students.

Mr. J. Vasudevan, Headmaster at government school in Kovur quips that these structures that can store filtered rainwater provide regular water to the school for months together. "We are also discussing with the panchayat to utilize the huge RWH sumps as storage tanks to store the water supplied by the panchayat during the summer that will benefit the school the most as water is supplied early mornings and the stored water can be utilized during daytime," he points out.

While the schools have found alternate ways to utilize the infrastructure we have created, for us, it is money well spent!

As people's participation has become imperative to combat water scarcity, we, at L&T, are focused to reach the ideas of water conservation and its judicious use to school-children.

The Rain Water Harvesting (RWH) structures constructed in association with United Way of Chennai, at four government schools in Chennai, have not only improved the ground water level at these locations but has also helped the institutions create awareness about rainwater harvesting and sustainability among the students.

The Government Higher Secondary School, Alapakkam, Govt Higher Secondary School, Mettukuppam, Government Girls Higher Secondary School, Chinna Porur, and Village Panchayat Union Middle school, Poothapedu, cumulatively cater to 6,000-odd students. Almost all of them know how the RWH works. Senior students are shown how RWH systems are created, in the hope that the know-how can inspire some of them to build similar systems for their homes and local communities.

Taking this success to the next level and to reach out to more budding young minds, we have created four new RHW structures at four more Government schools in and around the Manapakkam campus: The Government Boys Higher Secondary School, Kovur, Govt Girls Higher Secondary School, Kovur,



## 150+ families drink purified water. Their children have a new-look school.

All thanks to L&T's interventions at Ithambadu.

Ithambadu is a small village of about 150 families, an almost insignificant dot on the map, nestling amidst lush green paddy fields in Dagadarthi mandal of Nellore district in Andhra Pradesh. Lives for the 1,000-odd villagers has witnessed a dramatic transformation ever since L&T CSR entered the frame with a village development programme with the NGO, Hand In Hand India, as implementation partner.

#### Towards a healthier village

To start with, a quick study and analysis revealed that health was a major issue for the village and a lot of the ailments were attributable to the villagers consuming dirty, untreated water. Hence, the first point of intervention was to ensure that they had a ready, easily accessible source of good drinking water.

charges and other miscellaneous expenses are met from the user fee collected, the excess of which is placed in a Corpus. "Till date, since inception, the villagers have obtained 3 lakh litres of water and the Corpus has crossed the Rs. 25,000 mark," says a delighted treasurer, RO Committee, adding that water is being provided free of cost to the students of the village primary school.



The solution was to install a 500 LPH Community RO water facility that was inaugurated in 2022. After the initial reluctance to embrace change, the villagers have become smarter and healthier! Armed with a water ATM card, they now swipe it to get water whenever they need it. Not only are they, especially the women folk, saved walking long distances to fetch water but the incidence of ailments amongst the villagers has reduced drastically.

A self-sustainable model, the RO facility is maintained and run by a RO committee selected by community people itself. The maintenance & electricity



"Our lives have certainly become easier and better with this community RO," says **P Parameswari, Beneficiary – Ithambadu Village.** "Earlier, we had to travel 7 km to get drinking water, only at specific times and pay Rs. 20 for 20 litres of water that was too much for us. Now, we pay Rs. 5 for 20 litres and are saving time, getting water easily whenever we need it and our children and elderly people at home are no longer falling ill every now and then."

#### Towards more engaged school children

The next target was the village primary school that was in an extremely dilapidated condition with neither any proper education infrastructure for the children nor toilets or proper sanitation. During the survey, the Head Master, Mr. Y Mahesh Babu, of the Mandal Parishad Primary School-Ithambadu, had lamented about the lack of even a compound wall that allowed cattle and other animals to wander into the school premises.

After scoping, the work began, and in a few months, the school building wore an entirely new, fresh look with cheerfully painted interior and exterior walls,

and a sturdy compound wall to keep the children inside and the animals out. The classroom was renovated too and given a child-friendly ambience with colourfully painted wall murals and desks and benches so that children do not have to sit on the floor to study anymore.

Mahesh is an extremely proud and happy man. "The school now offers a conducive learning environment that is crucial for the children to produce the

necessary results and I am certain that after this renovation, our children will learn better and faster. Earlier, many parents were apprehensive about sending their children to school due to the bad infra and lack of toilets but now I am sure they will have no such fears."

The good news for Mahesh is that already the student population has grown from 18 to 21.

The school and toilet facilities were inaugurated and handed over to the community at a function held on February 2<sup>nd</sup> 2023, attended by representatives from the Education Department, Government of Andhra Pradesh, Hand in Hand India and L&T's CSR team. Of course, the ecstatic village people were in attendance in full force and voice.



#### **Towards more hygienic facilities**

Every child deserves to study in a safe and clean environment and the children of the Ithambadu school were struggling with almost non-existent toilets and lack of water. L&T's WASH (Water, Sanitation & Hygiene) intervention has resulted in renovated boys' and girls' toilets and a handwash unit. To save water, the rejected water from the RO unit is pumped and utilized for toilet usage.



# CSTIs sign MoUs to train rural youth to be industry-ready

# CSTI Jadcherla signs MoU with the Forest Department, Madhya Pradesh







We plan to train 2,500 rural youth over the next five years.

HCI IC's Construction Skills Training Institute (CSTI) Jadcherla signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Forest Department of Madhya Pradesh (North Seoni Division) to identify rural youth and train them to be industry-ready. The Forest Department will partly fund the initiative, provide the physical infrastructure including buildings at Lakhnadaun to establish a Construction Skills Training Centre (CSTC) and utilize its vast staff network to source rural youth from the remote villages in and around the Pench Tiger Reserve Area of Seoni district for enrolment.

The candidates will initially be trained at CSTC Lakhnadaun for one month followed by two months of training at CSTI Jadcherla. "We plan to train 2,500 rural youth over the next five years in civil trades like formwork, carpentry, bar bending, and scaffolding & masonry," informs Deepak Sharma, Principal, CSTI Jadcherla. The CSTI has already trained more than 3,000 rural youth of Madhya Pradesh over the past few years from the districts of Chhindwara, Balaghat, Khandwa, and Mandala and have successfully placed the candidates at various project sites of L&T Construction. CSTC Lakhnadaun, the fifth CSTC running under CSTI Jadcherla, started training in June 2022.

## CSTC Guna signs MoU with the State Rural Livelihoods Mission



With WET IC executing several important projects in Madhya Pradesh, the need for a large skilled workforce led to the creation of Construction Skill Training Centre (CSTC) at WWW SBG's Rajghat MVS Project in June 2022. Ever since, CSTC Guna has been collaborating with the local administration to identify unskilled youths from around the project area to train and deploy them at project sites. Now, an MoU signed between the CSTC and the Madhya Pradesh State Rural Livelihoods Mission (SRLM), Guna, will provide formal training to local youth. The CSTC will train candidates for 45 days in various trades including formwork, carpentry, bar bending, and scaffolding and place them at project sites in the vicinity.

# L&T to partner the Government of Assam to create a construction skills ecosystem

The Construction Skills Training Department (CSTD), Divisional Corporate, L&T Construction, and the Government of Assam signed an MoU by virtue of which L&T becomes their Knowledge Partner to set up a robust skilling ecosystem in the state for the construction industry. At the signing event, Assam's Chief Minister shared his state's ambition for skills culture to flourish among the Assamese youths and hoped that the several MoUs signed that day with various organizations, including L&T, would help to harness the state's potential in renewable energy, skill development, tourism & the hospitality industries.

L&T will offer knowledge support to establish a full-fledged Construction Skills Training Institute (a greenfield project), and support to set-up exclusive training centres for construction trades in two other locations, as brownfield projects. L&T will also provide technical guidance; recommend training courses; share course content; provide Training of Trainers (ToT) and training equipment, tools, in addition to hand-holding them for a period of twelve months.

The MoU was signed on 17<sup>th</sup> October 2022 by S. Ramkishore, Vice President & Head – HR, Divisional Corporate, L&T Construction, and Dr. B. Kalyan Chakravarthy, IAS, Principal Secretary – Skills, Employment & Entrepreneurship Department, on behalf of the Assam Skill Development Mission (ASDM).





## L&T's Skilling and Apprenticeship Mission under NAPS

## 1,763 NAPS apprentices certified; around 2,000 deployed at L&T sites



Launched in 2016 and governed by the National Skill Development Council (NSDC), the National Apprenticeship Promotion Scheme (NAPS) is the preferred vehicle for creating skilled manpower and empowering youth. L&T Construction, the first construction organization to register for NAPS in 2017, has thus far enrolled more than 10,000 apprentices under the scheme, with a large number met through trained manpower available at our own CSTIs. Under this scheme, well-trained apprentices are retained for a minimum of two years at L&T. NAPS scheme has triggered a three-fold increase in retention as compared to the normal means of deployment.

Skills training for various trades have been registered with CSDCI under the Optional Trades category, and such organizations are allowed by NSDC to directly issue NAPS completion certificates to trainees. Based on this mechanism, 1,763 candidates from different batches were recently felicitated and handed over NAPS certificates by S. Ramkishore, Vice President & Head – HR, Divisional Corporate, HQ.

NAPS has helped to supply trained workmen to mega projects and could further help with trained workmen through the centralized pool concept, a key focus area of the top management. Around 2,000 NAPS apprentices have already been deployed at the C4 & C6 packages of the High-Speed Rail project and at some project sites of M&M SBG.

# M&M SBG to train 1,000 rural youth every year

M&M SBG has entered into an MoU with the Department of Technical Education, Training & Skill Development (TET & SD) to set-up skilling centres at ITIs in 5 districts to train about 1000 marginalized youth every year, for which the Construction Skills Development Institute (CSDI) was created. M&M deploys trainers along with their men, material and machinery for back to back operations at the various centres under the aegis of CSTI Serampore.

- L&T will place candidates under the NAPS scheme in the formwork & carpentry, bar bending and masonry trades; training duration will be for 2 months
- ITI will provide the physical infrastructure including buildings for class rooms and open areas for practical training

Thanks to this initiative, 253 candidates have already completed their training and placed at L&T M&M construction sites under NAPS. In the current third batch, 77 candidates have successfully completed the course and have been offered placement at M&M construction sites much to the delight of the State Government.




