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Our STEM programme sinks deeper roots!

First STEM Innovation & Learning Centre inaugurated.

"When I grow up, I want to join the IAS," smiles R Shalini, with a quiet confidence that completely belies her age and state. For Shalini, an 8th standard student and several of her co-students at the Government Girls' Higher Secondary School, Porur, a suburb of Chennai, the doors to advanced learning have been flung wide open with the inauguration of the first STEM Innovation & Learning Centre (SILC), implemented by the American India Foundation (AIF), supported & sponsored by L&T. The launch of the Centre marks a significant milestone in L&T's 'Engineering Futures', a STEM intervention programme, kickstarted in 2019 initially involving 20 schools, that now has 45 schools within its ambit in Chennai, transforming the lives and aspirations of over 15,000 students.




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Welcome to a new world of teaching & learning

Equipped with a variety of new age instruments like a 3D printer, circuitry boards, tablets, et al, the girls revel in their newfound method of learning Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics. "This Centre will not only expose the students to enriching programmes like 'Engineering Futures,' but

will also help them make that vital connection between their classroom and the real world," enthused a delighted Chief Educational Officer for Tiruvallur, Mr. Ravichandran, though the Centre has something for the teachers as well.




A teacher's centre: The teacher's room is equipped with a studio set-up replete with a green mat and tools for recording & telecasting, along with a variety of other teaching aids to create educational content. Teachers are empowered with innovative teaching methods and learning practices, to help them change from the traditional 'chalk and talk' method to an interactive and intrinsic learning approach. "Podcasts are the flavour of the times and we are helping teachers create short films of a minute and sometimes more to 'virtually' explain concepts," explains Guga Priya, Regional Manager (South), AIF, who leads the initiative on the ground.

The students' learning centre: This space is neatly divided into four well-defined zones, starting with the Students' Incubation Corner where the children are given an incubation set with which they are encouraged to have fun with learning. Next, at the Al zone, they learn and experiment with robotics, smart homes, and how to battery-operate cars & rovers. The Aerodynamics zone features miniature rockets, carefully & meticulously crafted gliders, PICO satellites, and is a place to learn about space concepts and hydro-blasting. The final port of call is the 3D printer, where they are introduced to 3D designing & printing.



A hub-and-spoke model: 2 students each from the 45 STEM schools have undergone learning sessions at the SILC and are now trainers for other students in their respective schools. "We are operating through a hub-and-spoke model, fostering trans-disciplinary learning by integrating STEM concepts," elaborates Priya. "Our aim is to equip students with essential

skills to succeed in the world of the 21st century by encouraging them to enhance their technological skills and pursue careers in STEM and, at the same time, empower teachers to use

Other key components of intervention

STEM Clubs: In each school to promote hands-on technology learning. The STEM Club members act as ambassadors for 'Engineering Futures', taking classes, conducting experiments, and fostering peer-to-peer collaboration.

STEM Workshops on Aerodynamics and Space Technology: Are to introduce students to cutting-edge STEM models based on sensors and automation, including drones, virtual reality, astronomy, satellites, and math kits. They gain from advanced training too.

STEM Expos: 750+ students from 20 schools have found ideal platforms at various exhibitions to showcase their math skills in creative and engaging ways, while 2,000+ Science Exhibition explorers from 45 schools expanded their horizons by conducting cool science experiments. More than 1,000 students have undergone advanced training through exclusive workshops, delving into the realms of aerodynamics, basic electronics, artificial intelligence, coding, and the intriguing Pictobox, among other fascinating subjects.

L&T anchored the annual Dr. C V Raman STEM Exhibition & Competition that attracted hundreds of excited students.

Equal in every way: L&T helps people transcend gender barriers

In 2015, the Oxford English Dictionary introduced 'Mx' as an honorific for individuals who do not identify with a specific gender or are transgender. Even as the English language evolves, people's outlook is broadening too driven by those who defy stereotypes, challenge conventions, and confront societal prejudices.

Taking the lead, Prayas Trust chose to support two Tamil Nadu-based community organizations, Sahodaran and Born2Win, working with transgenders as part of the Joy of Giving initiative. 321 employees came forward to contribute Rs. 2,25,000 each to the two organizations to arm them in their fight against discrimination and stigma and to strengthen their focus on improving the mental and physical health of transgenders.

Both these organizations are aggressively engaged in advocacy with various stakeholders, that have resulted in some significant changes in Tamil Nadu like the establishment of the nation's first Transgender Welfare Board in 2008, celebrating Transgender Day on March 31st, the TN government's announcement to allow transgender self-help groups with a minimum of five members, the provision for shelter homes, and the allocation of 500 homes for trans individuals in Chennai.





Spreading hope and a sense of purpose

Founded by C. Sunil Menon in 1996, Sahodran has come a long way over the past two decades. Today, their Drop-in Center in Chennai welcomes 50 trans individuals daily, offering free mid-day meals and serving as a hub for entertainment, health aids, training, discussions, and counseling. Their outreach activities include home visits, support for trans individuals affected by violence or crisis, health and legal assistance. Their skills center provides training in various fields to help trans people find meaningful employment.

Mx. Sudha Palani and Mx. Jaya Annamalai, both transgenders, provide technical and operational support, emphasizing the importance of community acceptance and opportunities. "The funds contributed by L&T's employees will go toward educating four trans individuals and supporting an eatery run by another person, in addition to addressing numerous needs within the community," says Sudha with a sense of gratitude.



10 CLCs or Community Learning Centres and two Government school based remedial Centers support students from the 3rd to 8th grades, offering classes in Tamil, English, Maths, and computer fundamentals, with Socio Emotional Learning (SEL) integrated into the curriculum, to focus on teaching vital life skills. Considering the atmosphere most of these children live in, learning about interpersonal relationships, social awareness, self-awareness, and responsible decision-making go a long way to help them grow into good citizens.

Although the parents are busy juggling between jobs and household chores, with limited time, exposure, and resources to support their children's education, monthly parent-teacher interactions are organized for their feedback that are vital to sustain the programme, maintain attendance and modify the curriculum to address specific requirements. Community awareness sessions with parents highlight to them how domestic issues can impact a child's psychological well-being. These sessions also extend to expert counselling, wherever required.

Community members have wholeheartedly embraced the CLCs, recognizing their pivotal role in transforming the lives of students, with some going the extra mile by offering space for the Centres like those in Aaduthotti, North Chennai. In Ayothikuppam, Triplicane, Chennai, a local politician has offered his space rent-free, while in Ambedekar Nagar, again North Chennai, a community leader has donated a ₹30,000 worth projector for the Centre and frequently visits to motivate children.

Swift progress: from blueprint to reality in a span of less than 5 months

For Babita Patra, Raimat Majhi, Ankit Kumar and the other 73 girls and 99 boys, training at L&T's state-of-the-art Skills Training Institute at Pahadpur, Mayurbhanj, Odisha, is an opportunity of a lifetime; their ticket to a brighter future. Inaugurated by the Honourable President of India, Ms. Droupadi Murmu on 21st November 2023, the Institute is another significant step by L&T to empower the country's underprivileged youth. A collaborative effort between L&T and the SLS Trust, the initiative is being spearheaded by Itishree Murmu, daughter of SLS Trust's founder. Currently hosting 175 students, the Institute will soon expand to train 1,000 individuals annually, including women.

After graduating from their 3-month training course, Babita, Raimat, Ankit and their batchmates will be placed at L&T's project sites for some on-the-job training and thereafter absorbed. "What they make of their lives is entirely in their hands," remarked Raguraman Jayaramulu, Head—CSTD, who has been straining muscle and sinew at ground zero to get the Institute up and running in less than 5 months. "We are providing the best training facilities, opportunities, and an enabling environment for them to build their future. Fostering learning and environmental awareness in Bengaluru






